Quiz evening


After having a successful fundraising evening with 'Step Back in Time' in November, a village group is organising a Quiz and Supper at The Tiger.

Post Office moving

Lindfield looks set to mark the end of an era early next in 2015 as plans to move the Post Office have been revealed.

The proposed move, from the little shop on the corner of the High Street and Lewes Road, to Martins newsagents, follows the decision of Postmaster Alan Stamford to retire.

Alan and his wife Wendy have run the post office for 16 years but will be selling the premises to help fund their well earned retirement. Their two staff will also be retiring,

Over the past few weeks, customers have been taking part in a consultation exercise and commenting on the proposals to create a new modernised branch as part of Martins newsagents.

The benefits of the new branch will include improved accessibility and longer opening hours.

Customers will be able to visit the new Post Office on weekdays from 6am, when Martins currently opens for business. It will also open all day Saturday and on Sunday mornings from 7am to 1pm.

The majority of Post Office products and services will also still be available.

Residents were asked for their views on the suitability of the new location and if they had any concerns or suggestions.

"Overall most people are pleased that there will still be a Post Office in the village, although some will find change difficult," said Alan. "The longer opening hours will benefit lots of customers who will be able to pop into the Post Office on their way to work or on a Sunday morning.

"We're sad to be going as we have made a lot of friends here, but are looking forward to having our first big holiday for 16 years!" He added that the pair plan to visit their daughter in Australia.

The Post Office move is part of a national programme of modernisation and investment to provide new 'local style' branches all over the country.

The consultation closed on 17th December and the move is due to take place during February or March.

Opportunities for garden trainees and garden owners!

A garden just outside Lindfield has a vacancy for a local person who is interested in improving their practical gardening skills.

The 'Work and Retrain As a Gardener Scheme' (or WRAGS) provides men and women of all ages with the opportunity to work for 2 days a week for 12 months in a carefully sourced garden, under the instruction of a garden owner or head gardener.

The national scheme is co-ordinated across Sussex and South Hampshire by Liddy Davidson, who sets up the placements and supports trainees during their training year. Registration fees are charged to help with the costs of the scheme, which at present are £375 for trainees and £125 for garden owners. A non-taxable training allowance of £5 per hour is paid direct to the trainee by the garden owner. Liddy explains: "It is a 'win win' situation as garden owners benefit from the help they receive from enthusiastic and committed trainees, who in turn gain practical training and experience to go on to various careers in horticulture."

Current vacancies include Copyhold Hollow, a woodland garden near Lindfield which opens for the National Garden Scheme every year and where the owner is a very experienced gardener and knowledgeable plantswoman.

Liddy says: "It is a fabulous garden for a trainee who is looking to develop general gardening skills, but they

would need to be fit as it is quite steep in places!"

Additional nearby gardens which are expected to come available in 2015 include Borde Hill Gardens, a massive private garden with lakes and woodland north of Lindfield, and a fabulous private garden in Warninglid. Finally, the glorious Sussex Prairies on the Albourne Road near Henfield also offers 2 WRAGS placements which should be available again early in 2016.

Liddy adds: "It is always worth enquiring as placements may come up suddenly, new gardens come on stream and there are many more opportunities available if trainees are prepared to travel further afield.

The scheme is just one project offered by the historic charity, the WFGA (the Women's Farm and Garden Association), which was established in 1899. As part of the First World War commemorations earlier this year, BBC's 'Countryfile' highlighted that a WFGA member set up the Women's Land Army in 1912 – well before the First World War broke out.

WFGA members can also benefit from very useful workshops and workdays, informative newsletters, tours of gardens in the UK and Europe and members' gatherings in local gardens.

Lindfield school award for sport

Pupils and staff from Lindfield Primary School were presented with a Silver Kitemark for their commitment to the development of competition in PE and Sport at a ceremony early in December. James Smyth, the school's PE co-orindator, was accompanied by eight Year 6 children to receive the award on behalf of the school. With the support of Lorraine Everard and Mid-Sussex Active, the school has increased participation in extracurricular sporting clubs with over 85% of children in Key Stage 2 taking part in at least one club per week in the last academic year. The school has also improved their participation in both intra- and inter-school competitions in 2013/14. Children have taken part in house competitions throughout the year in a variety of sports and almost 200 children represented their school in a inter school competition in the last academic year. This has gone hand in hand with the success of some of these teams, with the cricket, tag rugby, hockey and tennis teams all reaching county finals by being crowned Mid-Sussex champions in the last 12 months.

The ceremony was hosted by GB Olympic Water Polo Captain Craig Figes, who spoke to the children about his own path to sporting success and how it began when he was at primary school. The children, who also make up the school's Sport Crew and lead their own sporting events throughout the year, were thrilled to accept the award. Mr Smyth said: "We are extremely





Church to run course for parents of teens

All Saints Church is running a parenting course specifically designed to support parents of teenagers, starting next month. The course, provided by Relationship Central, is a series of five weekly sessions where the topic is introduced by watching a DVD and then prompts discussions in smaller groups.

Antonia Easley, one of the organisers, assures parents: "There are no 'experts' in the room. We all just learn and share together. I did the course last year with friends and we all found it very practical, positive and full of tips that are actually common sense."

One of the core principles of the course material is that it's not just for those who are struggling with teenage issues. Antonia continues: "It's all about strengthening relationships with our teenagers, adjusting to changes and equipping them for life."

The course was created as part of the ministry of London church Holy Trinity Brompton - also responsible for the successful Marriage and Alpha courses. Some of the topics covered are: keeping the end in mind; meeting our teenagers needs; setting boundaries; developing emotional health and helping them make good decisions. All Saints are planning to add an extra session to explore how faith in God might help both teenagers and parents through this time.

Stuart Silk, Associate Vicar at All Saints Lindfield,



commented: "As a church we are doing this course because we believe God cares very much about families. We also know that there are times when parenting feels challenging! We want to help facilitate conversation and a bit of mutual support between parents, grandparents and carers right here in our community."

The Parenting Teenagers course is suitable for those parenting 11-18 year olds and will take place in The Tiger Lounge, next to All Saints Church, each Thursday evening 7-8.30pm on 5th,12th, 26th February and 5th,12th, 19th March. Katy should get full credit for this title. I had decided to focus this piece on what to consider when planning to redecorate and everything I came up with sounded either dull or bordering on patronising, which is not how I mean to sound. So here are some project tips – things to consider before getting the paintbrush out.

Think about the function of the space before you start anything. A large extension can seem like a great idea but unless thought has gone into how the space is going to be used and what for, then the result might fall short of expectations. By considering the purpose of the extension you start to think about the layout of the furniture, the storage you will need and, crucially, the electrical plan.....which brings me on to lighting. Well thought through lighting will make or break a scheme. Knowing where your furniture is going, what, if any, task lighting will be required in the room and where finishing touches like art will be hung will enable you to plan this in the early stages.

Paint colour can be matched to anything else, so choose fabric first. Given that Dulux will mix to any colour, it will always be easier to match paint to fabric than the other way around. I am regularly asked to find a fabric to work with a pre-defined wall colour and whilst not impossible, it limits choice hugely.

I have known people to get really hung up on 'what's in' in the context of interior design decisions. The danger of following trends is that some of them don't last long and those that do, the High Street tends to do to death so what looked fresh and appealing to start with becomes unoriginal and samey. But more fundamentally interior design is about creating environments which work for you. I have never, for instance, been a shabby

chic kind of girl. It's not an aesthetic that appeals to me, yet I see it in many homes and it works beautifully. It's just not for me and I think anyone who knows me would be surprised to see it in my home. Where you live should be a reflection of you and your personality. Decorating in line with a trend is fine if you love it but not something you should be governed by if you do not.

Cost cutting, or 'value engineering' as some of our commercial clients refer to it, should always be applied with care. There are things which you can most definitely save on, yet other aspects of a scheme which will let the whole design down if scrimped on. The best example of this is poles. If budget is a consideration, I would always encourage clients to spend on the pole and making, and save on the fabric. Beautifully made curtains in a cost-effective fabric on a statement pole will look so much better than gorgeous fabric adorning a cheap pole which after a while starts to part company with the wall. A stunning yet potentially budget-busting fabric can be used to great effect for a cushion, and backing it in a less expensive plain will reduce the cost even further.

I have never been an advocate of the maxim of 'out with the old and in with the new', since older pieces often add personality to a room which is so important. What I do encourage though is to be true to the new scheme and take a tough line with clutter. If a piece does not work with a scheme, then it might work elsewhere in the house. I have quoted William Morris before but his advice of 'Have nothing in your house that you do not know to be useful, or believe to be beautiful', quite simply never dates.

Butterbean and Lemon Soup

Tip a 400g can butterbeans into a sieve and rinse under cold water. Put into a pan with a crushed garlic clove (try using a smoked garlic clove), the finely grated rind and juice of 1 unwaxed lemon and 300ml vegetable stock. Bring just to the boil, cover and cook over medium heat for 5 min. Spoon into a processor, add 2tbs dried milk powder and buzz until smooth. Return to the pan and stir in a further 300ml vegetable stock. Season to taste and gently reheat to serving temperature (see note above). Serve topped with either chopped chives or grated cheese

Chestnut and Carrot Soup

Serves 4

Finely chop 2.5cm fresh root ginger. Heat a generous knob of butter in a large pan, add the ginger and a large chopped onion, cover and cook over low heat, stirring frequently, until the onion is soft and just beginning to brown. Add 700g peeled and chopped carrots, a drained 350g can whole peeled chestnuts (or a vacuum pack) and 900ml vegetable stock. Bring just to the boil, cover and cook over low heat for 20 min or until carrots are tender. Tip into a processor and buzz until smooth. Return to the pan and gently reheat to serving temperature. Serve with a swirl of cream or crème fraiche. Alternatively, add a spoonful or two of dried milk powder when pureeing.

Soup, soup, glorious soup, nothing quite like it for warming the heart. Not quite the words of Flanders and Swann but, I think, appropriate for the one food that is just right for the cold, damp and dark days of January. I hope you agree. Tips for good soup making:

- Onions, leeks, peppers and all root vegetables benefit from either lightly frying or roasting in the oven first before
 adding liquid, to bring out their natural sweetness. Pop a tray of lightly oiled vegetables in a hot oven when you
 are cooking a roast, for example, then chill them to make the soup later. The vegetables in the Butterbean and
 Lemon Soup could be cooked this way.
- At the same time bake a tray of bite-sized chunks of bread to make croutons. Before baking lightly spray with oil and dust with paprika, garlic powder or herbs for extra flavour.
- When a recipe includes milk or cream, always reheat very gently as boiling will spoil the texture. A spoonful or two of dried milk powder will add creaminess to a soup without diluting it.
- Most vegetable soups, just like casseroles, taste even better the day after making.
- Most soups can be made in the microwave, saving time and fuel. Of course they can also be reheated that way too do this on 50 or 75% power to avoid spoiling the texture, especially of cream soups.

Smoked Cheese Soup

Serves 2

This soup is just that little bit different. When cooking with cheese, choosing one with a distinctive flavour adds an extra dimension to the finished dish. Here I have used smoked Cheddar cheese which gives a very subtle mellow flavour but, for the best result, be sure to buy cheese that is really smoked not just 'flavoured with smoke'. Cheddar flavoured with chives could also be used.

Melt a small knob of butter in a pan and stir in 1 small red pepper, 1 small onion, 2 celery sticks and 1 medium carrot (all finely chopped). Cover and cook over low heat for about 10 min, stirring occasionally, until very soft. Sprinkle over 1tbs plain flour, stir to combine and cook for 2 min. Gradually stir in 450ml hot vegetable stock. Continue to cook, stirring, until the stock comes to the boil and the soup has thickened slightly. Add 50g finely grated smoked Cheddar cheese, stirring until melted then stir in 150ml single cream. Cook for little longer to serving temperature but do not allow to boil. Season to taste and serve.

Families in Lindfield and across Mid Sussex were saddened to hear of the death last month of funeral director Jerry Masters. Jerry, who was born in the village and went on to run one of the longest-standing Lindfield businesses, Masters and Son, died on 11th November, aged 81. Our thanks go to the Masters family for sharing some of Jerry's life story with us, taken for the eulogy read at his funeral at Wivelsfield Parish Church.

Jerry was born on 13th February 1933. His parents, Madge and Les Masters and his older sister Ann were living in the house called Downs in Lindfield High Street, which at the time was both family business and home.

He had a happy childhood in Lindfield - swimming in the Ouse in the summer, playing ice hockey and skating on the village pond in winter and enjoying tennis parties held on the lawn tennis court in the garden at Downs, now the site of the Co-op and Denman's Lane car parks.

Jerry's early education was at St Clair's school and Sharrow Prep School, both in Haywards Heath, where he remembered being very embarrassed having to walk home in the grey and pink uniform!

In 1944, when he was 11 years old, he became a full time boarder at Caterham School. He spoke fondly of his time at Caterham and continued to attend old boys events after he had left.

He was pleased to return recently to watch Seb, his youngest grandson, play cricket for Ardingly College against his old school.

Jerry joined the 1st Lindfield Cubs as a young child, went on to become a Scout and a Senior Scout with the 1st Caterham School and continued as a Rover Scout with 1st Haywards Heath after he left school. Jerry had many stories of his time as a Rover Scout, invariably involving their official mode of transport which was an

old London taxi affectionately named Arabella. One tale involved Jerry holding an unsecured door closed as they drove through Lindfield and in a momentary lapse of concentration, when he waved to a friend walking by the pond, letting go of the door which promptly fell off!

On another occasion, on an important scouting trip to the Sergison Arms when the petrol pump was broken, Jerry recalled a fellow Rover Scout having to hold the petrol in a jam jar through the car door above the engine.

Jerry's employment started in 1949 at Shaw Stores, a very modern grocery store, which occupied about four shops on the corner of George Street in Hove. He left Shaw's to join Masters & Tulleys Grocers shop in Hurstpierpoint. He told his son lan that Mr Shaw had not been the most generous of employers and hadn't been too pleased when Jerry handed in his notice, paying him his final pay a day late and exclusively in coppers!

In 1951 Jerry was called up to for National Service and spent 3 years with the Royal Air Force. He was based mostly at RAF Watton in Norfolk but also served, among other places, at Bridgenorth, Locking, Chigwell and Gilze de Rijen in Holland. Jerry trained as a Ground Wireless Mechanic. On one occasion when he was working on a radio sitting on a chair on wheels on a highly polished floor using an uninsulated screwdriver, he received a huge electric shock which propelled him the entire



length of the room. He spoke of another occasion when a lot of time and effort had gone into building a huge radio which immediately burst into flames when it was turned on.

Having survived National Service he joined the family firm of Masters & Son in Lindfield. At that time Masters & Son was a general store which provided everything for the community. Their advertising slogan was at one time 'From the cradle to the grave'. Jerry qualified as a member of the Grocers Institute and obtained his diploma in Funeral Directing.

Jerry met José in 1956 at a dance in Sussex Hall, South Road, Haywards Heath. They married just 9 months later at Newick Village Church and went on honeymoon to Denmark. Their eldest son Philip was born in 1960 when Jerry & José were living at The Old Laundry Cottage in Paxhill and Ian was born soon after the family moved to Wivelsfield Green in 1962.

In the early 1960s Jerry joined the Royal Observer Corps - Lima 2 unit at the Cuckfield surface and underground observer post as a volunteer. He received a Long Service medal after 12 years with the ROC and was interested recently to see photos of the underground bunker which has now been restored.

Jerry became a member of Haywards Heath Rotary Club in 1962, following in his father Leslie's footsteps. During his membership he was President, archivist and Club Secretary. He was made an honorary member in 2011 and received the 50 year membership award in 2012. More recently he was invited to join Larks (Life after Rotary Club) and really enjoyed the company and friendship at the monthly get togethers.

A really important date, which Jerry was determined to reach despite his illness, was the 27th September 2014 when Wivelsfield Little Theatre celebrated its 50th anniversary. Jerry and José were founder members and



the WLT was a very significant part of their life through which they formed lifelong friendships. Over the years Jerry was involved both as a performer and backstage, where he enjoyed being part of the technical team.

Jerry adored his grandsons Sam and Seb, and supported them wholeheartedly in everything they did. He would be on the touchline with José in all weathers watching Seb play football, hockey or cricket. He loved seeing Sam perform and was so proud of his achievements, most recently in August when Sam wrote a play which was performed at the Edinburgh Festival.

Jerry was passionate about opera at Glyndebourne and less than a month before he died he went with close friends to two operas which he really enjoyed and said they had been amongst the best he had seen.

Typical of his kind nature, Jerry was very keen to be involved in a Macmillan Coffee Morning held upstairs at Masters & Son in October. With the help of family and friends the event raised more than £500. The family hope to continue fundraising in Jerry's memory in the future.

Jerry was also really pleased to see the start of a display of the company history, including photos of him as a young boy in a huge pair of wellington boots in front of the old fire station in Lindfield, which is now used as a store for the Lindfield Dramatic Club.

Jerry continued to be involved with Masters and Son up to a couple of weeks before he died. His family and friends were all so impressed by the way that he continued to live life to the full despite his illness. He will be greatly missed not only by his family and colleagues but by all the special friends he has made over the years.

Developers obtained planning permission in 2013 for 230 more homes on green field land east of Gravelye Lane, despite vigorous local opposition. Barratt Homes, who are doing the building, have been required by Mid Sussex District Council to hold regular liaison meetings with local residents. We have been participating in these meetings, in the interest of at least minimising disruption to the community now that construction is underway. We have also been using the opportunity to hold Barratt's to account for unfinished business connected with their previous project, 'The Limes' at Newton Road. Most notably, they have yet to transfer ownership of the neighbouring Wilderness Field to the district council, as required by a planning condition. We continue to press them on this and other issues that are indicative of their respect for the community in which they are operating.

Other Planning Matters

During the past 12 months the Society has scrutinised about 170 planning applications throughout the two Lindfield Parishes. We have attended 16 meetings of the Lindfield Parish Council's Planning & Traffic Committee to make representations on behalf of the Society, which we believe the Council find useful even if they do not invariably agree with us. Following the sad circumstances that resulted in the closure of Bookstop, we have pressed successfully for the premises not to be given over to other purposes until efforts to return it to retail use have been exhausted. We had, regrettably, to oppose changes at Old Place that would have resulted in the loss of historic fabric and damage to its setting. English Heritage raised related concerns. Changes at Heathers and on adjacent land in The Wilderness were of considerable concern but it is reassuring to see this substantial house being returned to use as a family home. It has been gratifying to see a number of our historic buildings being repaired or sympathetically altered to preserve both their usefulness and historic character.

We managed to ensure a proper set of conditions was put in place to control the import of soil to build up an area between the Roundhouse and the Ouse at Fullingmill Farm. Our aim was to respect the legitimate



needs of our rural economy whilst preventing a repeat of the damage to High Street buildings and the distress to residents that resulted from a previous, uncontrolled earth moving campaign in the Rural Parish.

Funding cuts to the Environment Agency are threatening the proper operation of Pimm's Lock and unfortunately we may well see much lower levels in the Ouse at Lindfield Bridge and at Dean's Mill unless policy can be changed.

Talks in King Edward Hall

There will be another programme of talks in the King Edward Hall in 2015, exploring topics like Wakehurst during the wars, a year in the life of a downland farm and how to protect ourselves from modern fraudsters. Please see our website (below) for details.

BOOK REVIEW

In each generation there are people who mean a lot to the people but then, as history moves on, they are often forgotten by the next. For the twenty years after the First World War, the best selling poet of that event was not Wilfred Owen or Rupert Brooke but it was a clergyman. G.A. Studdert Kennedy was an Anglo-Irish priest who determined to join the British Army to minister to the soldiers. He began by being an enthusiastic supporter of the fight but by the end he had seen so much death and destruction that he had changed his mind. His nickname gives the book its title, as he would give encouragement to the men at the front by providing them with cigarettes. Holman traces the life of this extraordinary man but, unlike most biographers, we are not just left with the bare facts but he uses these to encourage himself and his readers to learn lessons from Studdert Kennedy's life. Biography can be a moral literature, as we learn from the mistakes and the successes of others.


Local psychotherapist, Ania Tylunas, is encouraging members of the public to put their emotional and physical health at the top of the list of their New Year's Resolutions.



Hands on approach

TEEING OFF

This month I wanted to cover the golf grip for you. The grip is vital, as your hands are the only part of your body which comes into contact with the club.

There are three basic golf grips: the overlap, the interlock and the baseball grip (also known as 10 finger grip). The most commonly used grip is the overlap; the little finger of the right hand is hooked over the left forefinger (reverse for left-hander). For the interlock these two fingers lock together.

The baseball grip is ideal for people with small or weak hands. All 10 fingers are placed directly on the club, with the little finger of the right hand and the forefinger of the left hand touching.

The pressure of your grip should never be too firm a firm pressure usually results in you topping the ball or cutting across it. Unnecessary muscle tension also slows down the speed of your swing. Grip with a light pressure, however not light enough so the club comes out of your hands.

Next make sure that you're gripping the club in your fingers and never in the palms. If you are someone who wears out their glove in the palm, then this is a bad sign. If your elbows are bent then this usually means you are gripping in the palms.

Don't grip the club right at the end; place your left hand about an inch from the top of the grip. Holding it slightly lower down will give you a lot more control during the swina.

When positioning your left hand on the grip you should be able to see two knuckles pointing towards your face. The right hand should then be placed under the left with the thumb and forefinger making a 'V' which points up to your right shoulder.

If your hands are too far round to the right (three knuckles) of the correct grip, you will likely hit the ball left. Similarly, if your hands are too far round to the left (one knuckle) you will likely hit the ball right.

A golf glove is a real help as this will help stop any slipping and give you more consistent shots. www.haywardsheathqolfclub.co.uk
