## Neighbourhood Plan passed

The Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Neighbourhood Plan successfully passed through its referendum stage in January, when 28.6% of the electorate turned out to vote. A very high percentage (95%) of those who voted registered their support for the Plan. The Plan now needs to be formally 'made' by Mid Sussex District Council (hopefully in the next couple of months), when it will become a planning document that must, by law, be taken into account when deciding planning applications in the area of the two Parishes.

Councillor Alan Gomme, the Chair of the Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, said: "What a great result for our communities in the two parishes! This was a real community effort. My Steering Group was made up of councillors from both Parish Councils and was hugely helped by members of the public on the four Focus Groups that did the ground research that formed the basis of the Plan. These consisted of nearly forty members of our communities, covering all age groups and professions. It is now up to Mid Sussex District Council in particular to take note of this result and to abide by the planning policies that it contains."

## Aircraft noise

Has anyone noticed the increase in air traffic over Lindfield? This is particularly obvious in the early morning (from 5.30am) and late at night (sometimes after 11.30pm). It seems that Lindfield is not only being besieged by housing developers but we are under attack from the skies as well!

It would appear that this has been caused by the decision of the Director of Airspace policy to allow Gatwick Airport to fly outside the existing Noise Preferential Route. The effect of this is that the aircraft are flying in a wider route as they approach or leave the airport, hence more aircraft for Lindfield and of course Gatwick. This is not permanent and is due to be reviewed. Furthermore, Gatwick Airport have said that they will listen to local comment.

## Hickstead launches volunteer scheme

The organisers at the All England Jumping Course are looking for keen volunteers who wish to be part of Hickstead's two flagship summer events – the Equestrian.com Hickstead Derby Meeting (23rd-26th June) and the Longines Royal International Horse Show (26th-31st July).

It's the first time Hickstead has held an official volunteer scheme. "It's something that has become increasingly popular in the horse world, especially after London 2012 and the 'Gamesmakers'," explained Hickstead Director Edward Bunn. "Our volunteer scheme will give people the opportunity to be part of our shows, experience new things, add to their skills and get up close to the action."

Candidates can choose to volunteer at either or both shows, and opportunities will range from assisting in the hospitality areas, helping with the running of the eight national arenas, stewarding the grandstands, crossings or horse walk areas, or co-ordinating the other volunteers.

The volunteers will be required to work a minimum of two days at the show, with shifts generally lasting around 9hrs. The volunteers will swap jobs every 2 hours, making the jobs more diverse. All applicants must be at least 18 years old by 22nd June 2016.

## Local runners help two charities

Two Lindfield runners have taken up the challenge of Marathon running, inspired by two very different charities.



First time marathon runner Martin Hadden will join the starting line at the Brighton Marathon on 17th April. He is attempting to raise £3,000 to fund the participation of a youngster at the 2020 Shorinjiryu Renshinkan Karate world championships in Kagoshima Japan.

Martin, who lives in the village with his wife Michelle and two children, works as the Group Executive Head Chef for Historic Sussex Hotels (which includes Ockenden Manor in Cuckfield). He explained why he's so passionate about the sport and supporting young martial artists.

"I am a 1st dan black belt and was lucky enough to represent England at last year's world championships in Taiwan along with a team of 34," he said.


"As a team we did remarkably well getting two members through to the quarter finals, an achievement that hasn't happened before. However, participation is self-funding and it costs about £3,000 per person.

"It would be wrong for a young talented martial artist to miss out on such an experience just because they couldn't afford it."

He added that Renshinkan is a very traditional style of Karate and Renshinkan England is based in and around Mid Sussex. Shihan Julia Turley, from Haywards Heath, is head of Renshinkan England, and members train at the Triangle, the Dolphin, Scaynes Hill, Turners Hill, Hassocks, Burgess Hill and Ardingly.

Ant Jarman will be running in the Brighton Half Marathon on 28th February.

He explained about how he took up running after watching the London Marathon on television.

"I'd always wanted to run a marathon," said Ant.
"I'd grown up watching the London Marathon on TV
every year and made it one of my ambitions (along with
travelling the world). When I turned 30 in 2012 I knew it
was now or never and having recently moved to Lindfield
I realised it was a great area for training. Lots of hills and
amazing runs into the countryside!"

There was further motivation when Ant's 'other half', Wayne, was diagnosed with the gene for Huntington's Disease. "This gave me a great charity to raise money for and since my first run - the Great South run in 2012 - I have helped raise more than £3,000 for the charity," he said. "I've also roped in some friends who are also addicted to running now!"


Ant has now completed 4 marathons. "The first three were in Brighton and I finally got to run London in 2015. My best time is 3hrs 28 minutes."

Ant has also run five half marathons.

"Lindfield has definitely helped my running," he said. "I'm always amazed at how many other joggers I see out and about - and they are all so friendly - always a smile and a 'hello' as I pass."



Early last year two neighbours in Newick discovered that they had each received a Christmas present of a Ukulele. Unfortunately, neither had any experience of how to play it!

So the pair decided to attend a 'jam' in Tonbridge Wells which was open to experienced and novice players alike. What they found was a band of about 40 people, male and female, young and old, all playing their hearts out and singing heartily, mainly to music from the 60s & 70s plus other well-known songs. The warm atmosphere was infectious.

On the car ride home, Ron and Phil (pictured right) decided to set up their own club using the same format, inviting people who either already had a ukulele or were interested in learning to play. The idea was that everyone could learn as they went along, with the help of any experienced players, combined with home learning from sources such as the internet.

A small room was offered by The Rose and Crown pub in Fletching, a name was chosen (WUPS! - Weald Ukulele Players & Singers) and recruitment began. It was decided that meetings would be held twice monthly (currently the 2nd and 4th Monday evening of each month). The first meeting was held in April 2015 with six members present.

The formula proved successful, and membership currently stands at 20, with an average of around 14 attending meetings.

The increasing membership has also resulted in the group relocating to bigger premises at The Inn on the Green at Scaynes Hill.

Members gave their first 'public' performance just before Christmas last year. The 'Friends and Family' evening was a great success with standing room only!

Encouraged by this success, the group has another performance booked in April this year which will raise money for charity.

The club has also published four song books, which are all available from the website www.wups.info

Villagers dropping into the Anchor Coffee shop in Scaynes Hill on Shrove Tuesday were guaranteed a 'flipping' good time!

Freshly cooked pancakes with a selection of toppings were cooked and served alongside the usual homemade cakes and scones.

Pancake chef and village resident Clive Welland was kept busy all morning cooking, flipping and serving the hungry customers. Many took the chance to try his special recipe – pancakes with dark syrup and pancetta, which he discovered while living and working in the Netherlands.

Clive has cooked pancakes for the village for the past three years and says the secret of a successful pancake is quite simple: "Whisk the batter and store in the fridge for at least an hour before serving."

The pancakes went down a treat with customers who included Vicar Lisa Barnett and daughters Cara and Amy. Lisa is delighted at how the Anchor Coffee Shop, held in the annexe next to St Augustine's Church, has evolved since it first opened its doors in 2012.

"When the annexe was built we wanted it to be used by the community in Scaynes Hill and not just the church congregation," she explained. "The coffee shop was started by three of our parishioners and for the first year almost everyone who came was a member of the church. "But in the second year it suddenly took off and it has now become the 'place to be' in the village on a Tuesday morning!

"We are very proud of our coffee shop; it's become a very special place for the village."

Run by teams of volunteers, the

Anchor Coffee Shop opens every Tuesday from 10am to 12 noon.

Gaynor Deal, one of the team leaders, said new volunteers are always welcome. "Volunteers generally sign up for one session a month. It's hard work, but very enjoyable."

She added that the coffee shop often welcomes visitors, including the community choir, school and local playgroup, and raises funds for local charities. Earlier this year nearly £400 was raised for Family Support Work.

"It's been wonderful to see the coffee shop develop and reach people way beyond the church," Gaynor added. "That's what it's all about."





All young curates look forward to the day when they are given their own parish, but when Gerald and Jill Bridgman took up their post in Crawley there was no church or vicarage, just a muddy field!

The newlyweds were chosen to build a whole new parish – the first to be created in Sussex since the war.

Now retired and living in Lindfield, Canon Bridgman and his wife Jill look back on a lifetime of service to the church, and a journey which took them from an outbuilding with a makeshift holy table to the magnificent church of Holy Trinity Hull and York Minster.

Born in 1922, Gerald Bridgman was educated at Weymouth Grammer School, where he excelled both in the classroom and on the sports field, representing the school in soccer and athletics.

After leaving school he went into accountancy, working for Dorset County Council's Treasurers Department before leaving to join the Royal Army Ordinance Corps when he was 19 years old.

"I was part of a team based at headquarters in Leicester, lecturing and preparing units for the D Day landings," Gerald recalled. "As a committed Christian I was often called upon for pastoral work and always strived to be compassionate when making difficult decisions."

Gerald's call to the ministry had come several years earlier, so after leaving the army he went straight to Bristol Theological College for two years and then to St Catharine's College in Cambridge, where he left with an Hons Degree in Theology and University soccer colours! He was ordained at Chichester Cathedral in 1951.

"I could have gone straight into being a curate but I felt I wanted to further my knowledge of theology, so I spent a year studying at Wycliffe Hall Theological College in Oxford," said Gerald. "I was also pleased to play for the Oxford University Soccer Centaur."

His first job was as a curate at Broadwater parish in Worthing, where he was invited to become Chaplain of the Sea Cadets. He also continued his sport, playing football for Worthing FC and joining the church tennis club where he met his future wife Jill, a musician, who worked with the church youth groups.

Gerald and Jill were married in 1956, and soon afterwards were given a rare and exciting opportunity to build their own parish.

"Following the extensive bombing in London, people were moving further afield into new towns and the church was looking to build a new parish in Crawley," Gerald explained. "We were asked to set up St Mary's Church at Southgate - the first parish church to be built in Sussex since the war."

"We started from scratch," said Jill. "When we arrived it was just farmland! There were no lights and everything seemed very primitive.

"Our first job was to find a place to hold services. The only building available was a former stable used by workmen. We set up two benches and a kitchen table covered with a scorched bedspread and a wooden cross and held our first service. We could not help but remember that Christianity started in a stable, so it seemed appropriate that our new parish should start life in a similar building!"

As the weather got colder a workman would light a fire in the small stove. "There were times when we nearly choked from the fumes, but people continued to come along every Sunday and we soon had adults and children. We played hymns on a harmonium."

As the congregation grew, services moved to the infant school, a community hut and junior school before the Parish Church was finally completed.

But not only did the couple have their hands full building the church, they also became parents to two daughters. "The girls grew up alongside the church," said

Jill. "I remember one daughter climbing up to sit on her daddy's knee during a service!"

The church was consecrated in 1958 and later that year welcomed two very special visitors – the Queen and Prince Philip. "The Queen visited the church after opening Gatwick Airport," said Gerald. "I remember Prince Philip asking me why I was a priest in charge and not a vicar. I said that I could only become a vicar once the boundaries had been changed and we officially became a parish.

"He replied that he hoped, after all our hard work, that they would make me a vicar very soon!"

The meeting with the Royal couple proved to be the first of many. "We have met the Queen and her family several times," said Jill. "She has a wonderful memory and will always recall where we last met."

During his time at Crawley, Gerald was also secretary of the Chichester Diocese Evangelical Fellowship and served on the Church Assembly (the predecessor to the General Synod). He also baptised more than 2,000 babies and regularly produced 1,000 parish magazines, delivered by 50 visitors.

"By the time we left the parish was thriving with five staff, 500 Sunday School children and 100 teenagers.

"We also set up daughter churches at Holy Trinity, Tilgate and St Andrews at Furnace Green, and had begun work on a third daughter church for Broadfield."

In 1967 Gerald became vicar of Holy Trinity Church in Hull. "It is the largest parish church in England, larger than two thirds of English Cathedrals," said Gerald. "It was a daunting job with a heavy workload."

The job included being in change of five chaplains, of different denominations, at Hull Royal Infirmary. "Hull has well over 250,000 residents and the hospital building is 13 storeys high," said Gerald. "We could be called upon at any time of the day or night."

He also became chaplain to many organisations, including the Missions to Seaman, conducting a service of remembrance for 59 people lost when three Hull Trawlers sunk.

Another interesting role was Chaplain to the Actors Church Union. "The church provides tremendous support for the acting community, and during my service I met very many interesting people, including Norman Wisdom and the actor who played the vicar in Dad's Army!" said Gerald, who also served as County Chaplain of St John's ambulance, Chaplain to the Lord Mayor and High Sherriff and communications officer for the C of E in Hull.

This led to guest appearances on television and radio, including local, national, BBC world service and a weekly radio broadcast on Sunday mornings.

A member of the General Synod, the Church's Parliament, for most of his ministry, Gerald was invited by the Archbishop of York to become Canon of York Minster, Prebend of Botevant.

"It was a great honour, which included having my own seat in York Minster!" said Gerald.

Another honour in Gerald's career was when he received the Award of Officer Brother of the Order of St John from the Queen.

Gerald's contribution to the Church was further acknowledged in 1987 when he retired and was made Canon Emeritus of York Minster for life. "You would expect to lose the title on leaving the Diocese, so to be made Canon Emeritus is a great honour," he said.

In 1987 the couple moved to Lindfield. "We decided to move south to be nearer to Jill's mother who lived in Worthing and to our two daughters," said Gerald.

"We drew a circle round an area where the girls lived," added Jill. "We know Sussex quite well following our time in Crawley and had visited most of the parishes including All Saints, which we particularly liked."

The pair settled in William Allen Lane before moving to their current home in The Welkin where they have lived for the past 22 years.

On arrival in Lindfield Gerald became an Hon Clergyman at All Saints Church and represented retired Clergy on the Deanery Synod. He has also had nine chaplaincies in Europe with the Intercontinental Church Society and cared for around 20 churches in Sussex where there were vacancies or holidays. This included six months at Balcombe.

Since retiring he has taken more than 1,500 services and funerals for many churches.

He also joined the Rotary Club of Haywards Heath, Lindfield and Cuckfield Probus Club, Lindfield Bowling Club, the Preservation Society, U3A and Ramblers Group.

At 93, Gerald remains an active member of the All Saints parish. He enjoys keeping in touch with friends and colleagues from Hull and remains a committed fan of Hull Football club. He is particularly pleased to see them strongly placed for promotion back to the premiership and recently beating Brighton in the FA Cup!



## Chocolate Truffle with Coffee Cream

Serves 6 generously

Line a 900g loaf pan with non-stick paper. Put 150g plain chocolate, 115g creamed coconut and 50g unsalted butter into a bowl and soften over hot water or microwave MED. 3 min. Stir in 250g chopped ready-to-eat dried pineapple and 200g finely crushed shortbread biscuits. Whip 300ml double cream to soft peaks then whisk in 2tbs rum. Fold into the chocolate mixture, spoon into the tin, cover and chill at least 24 hours. To make the sauce stir 1tbs instant coffee granules into 450ml single or whipping cream and gently heat to dissolve (or use Camp coffee concentrate).

Sweeten if wished and serve lukewarm spooned over slices of the Truffle.

## Chocolate Mousse Cake

Serves 6-8

Line the base and sides of a 20cm springform pan. Finely crush 275g chocolate digestive biscuits and stir into 75g melted butter. Firmly press to the base and sides of the pan. Melt 250g marshmallows in 4tsp milk and, in another bowl, melt 350g plain chocolate with 2tbs strong coffee (or Camp) over hot water or on 75% in the microwave. Whip 425ml double cream to soft peaks. Gently and evenly fold in the melted marshmallows and chocolate. Pour into the crust. Refrigerate overnight. Delicious served plain or, even better, topped with diced mango and raspberries!

Easter is traditionally associated with eggs, both real ones, painted and decorated, and chocolate eggs. It dates back many years – elaborately painted and engraved ostrich eggs dating from 60,000 years ago have been found in Africa. Eggs painted red in memory of the blood of Christ have been found in early Christian Mesopotamia. Far more elaborate and expensive are the beautiful jewelled and enamelled eggs made by Faberge for the Russian Tsars.

Virtually every country has their own tradition of Easter eggs, and now the busy Easter Bunny hides chocolate eggs everywhere! Why not start your own tradition of hand painting hard-boiled eggs and hanging them from a small branch or arranged in a straw-lined basket.

Chocolate is, of course, also associated with Easter. Please try one – or all – of my favourite chocolate recipes.

## Chocolate Lemon Creams

### Serves 4

Dissolve 1 lemon jelly in 450ml boiling water. Chill until just syrupy. Melt 100g chocolate drops (milk or plain) over hot water or in the microwave. Pour the semiset jelly, the chocolate and 150ml single cream into a blender or processor and buzz until blended and frothy. Immediately pour into four tall glasses and chill until set.

## White Chocolate Pots

### Serves 4-6

Melt 150g white chocolate over hot water (or MW). Stir into 150ml soured cream and 1tbs rum. Whisk 150ml double cream to soft peaks and fold into chocolate mixture. Spoon into 4-6 glasses, cover and chill for at least 2 hours. A sprinkling of grated plain chocolate on top would look pretty.

Do you get confused about what you can and can't recycle? Do you sometimes wonder if it's worth the effort and if the waste you put in your blue bin actually gets recycled?

And what really happens after the recycling lorry leaves your street?

The good news is that here in Mid Sussex we are currently recycling around 40% of our waste. But there's still a long way to go if the council is to meet the government target of 50% by 2020.

To reach this target it's important that we all increase the amount we recycle, but at the same time make sure we're not putting the wrong items in our blue bins.

The most common items placed in bins that can't be recycled include:

- Plastic bags
- Plastic film such as from around magazines and bubble wrap
- Shredded paper
- Paper towels
- Crisp packets
- Pet food pouches
- Polystyrene
- Clothes and textiles

Mixing these items can not only ruin the quality of the rest of the recycling but can also damage the sorting machinery.

It's also important that items put out for recycling are clean, dry and placed loose in the recycling bin (the sorting machines are clever but can't untie plastic bags!).

When recycling is collected from our homes (1), the bins are emptied into a truck which automatically compacts the waste before taking it to the transfer station at Burgess Hill.

The recycling is then weighed (2) and loaded into larger trucks which transport it to the high-tech sorting plant, or Materials Recycling Facility, at Ford.

The mixed material is loaded on to a conveyor belt which leads to a 'trommel screen' (3). This is like a giant washing machine drum which separates paper from containers and cardboard.

As the trommel turns, glass bottles and jars smash and the pieces fall through a set of holes. The smallest pieces are used for aggregate and the larger pieces are sent for re-melt into new glass bottles and jars (4).

Remaining items flow through smaller holes into the 'ballistic separator' which removes small pieces of paper and separates plastic bottles, cans, paper and card. A magnetic belt attracts steel, cans, aerosols and jam jar lids.

Plastic containers then pass through an optical sorter (5), which uses sensors to identify and separate two different types of plastic bottle, splitting them by colour (6).

With the glass, plastic containers, steel and aluminium removed (7), the mixed paper and card, newspapers and magazines go through a final quality control check before being baled ready for sale (8).

Wherever possible materials for manufacture are kept within the UK, and currently all plastic bottles are sent for reprocessing within England.

A plastic bottle sent for recycling could be made into a new product and be back on the shelves within 6 weeks! And 25 recycled bottles are enough to make one adult fleece jacket!

If you are now inspired to reduce your waste and recycle more, here's a few ideas to steer you in the right direction:

Visit the Household Waste Recycling Site in Burgess Hill where you can recycle many more materials - including wood, textiles, garden waste and electrical equipment.

Recycle your shoes clothes and books at one of the many communal recycling banks (often found in supermarket car parks).

Donate unwanted household items, clothes and toys to your local charity shop.



When I first started out in interior design one of my biggest worries was whether I would ever view a project for the first time and have absolutely no idea on how to tackle it. How awful would it be to stand in someone's sitting room before expectant faces with a completely blank mind? The truth is I have never actually met a client who has asked me for ideas within minutes of walking into the room in question, and whilst I have thankfully never suffered from the dreaded mind blank, where I have not been instantly inspired, the ideas do start to flow as the meeting progresses and I begin to get a feel for the space and the client's needs. That said, there are some projects where I am hit with a vision the second I walk through the door, and Petworth Cottage Nursing Home was one such project.

This respite and palliative care home operates from the old cottage hospital in Petworth. The building has been extended and refurbished periodically, and what used to be one of the original wards has been designated as a lounge for visitors. As is often the case with rooms not in daily use, the space has been used for short term storage, in this case wheelchairs and hoists. The dual function left it often cluttered and the cold blue decor made it uninviting. Our client was keen to make it primarily a space for relatives – home from home, not part of the hospital, and somewhere they could relax in and retreat to when visiting loved ones.

When I first saw the room I was hit by the gorgeous views over the Sussex countryside to Petworth House and also how tranquil the room felt. Yes it felt cold and unloved, but the structure and location were great – triple aspect, with a high ceiling and plenty of features. Coming back to HQ I shared this vision with the team. Storage for large items was important, a mixture of seating styles set out to enable more than one family to use the space at any one time was vital and it had

to feel warm, nurturing and also uplifting. A large fitted cupboard now provides a home for wheelchairs and hoists, a fireplace adds a homely touch and an all important focal point, sofas, occasional seating and dining areas offer plenty of flexible seating, and a combination of chandeliers, downlights, floor and table lamps ensure that the mood of the room can be changed to suit whoever is using it.

Our client is thrilled with the finished scheme and within days of it being completed a family were able to benefit from the new lounge. I love projects like this. I have said this here before but it's what interior design is all about – creating spaces that people want to spend time in and that make them feel good. Providing a sanctuary for relatives at what is often an emotionally draining time has been an incredibly rewarding project. I would like to thank our assistant designer, Nichola Hayler, who completely shared my vision and worked incredibly hard to make the new space what it is.

# Grip to fit

#### **TEEING OFF**

#### By James Verrall, Head Golf Professional

The golf grip is a key fundamental part of the golf swing. It can play a big part in the direction of the ball and the distance. This month we will look at how to check if you are holding the club correctly and also if you have the right size grips on your club.

You should hold the club about 1" down from the very end of the grip. If not, then you will not have control of the club which will cause you to use too much wrists. Grip pressure should be firm but not to the point where you feel you are squeezing the club.

Can the wrong size grip affect where the ball goes??.....YES

If you have a grip which is too small then vou are more likely to hit the ball left. The club could twist, forcing you to tighten your grip and squeeze the club at impact with the ball. This will close the face of the club and cause the shot to hook left.

If you have a grip which is too large then you are more likely to hit the ball to the right. The club can come loose at the bottom of the swing, opening the club face and creating a slice instead of a shot toward the target.

Take a look at the pictures above to help you find out if you have the correct size grips. A grip which is too small will see the fingers of your left hand touch your left palm. A grip which is too big will see a large gap between your left fingers and the left palm. When correct there should be a very small gap between the fingers and the palm.


The annual subscription is £25, starting in January each year, and there is a charge of £4 per visit for visitors.



# 95% vote 'YES'!




